ONE-OF-A-KIND VEHICLE DONATION



DEAR FRIENDS OF RAWHIDE,

This year, Rawhide experienced a financially challenging situation due to the pandemic and state shutdown. Each of our locations needed different changes to properly function in the new world we found ourselves in. Luckily, Rawhide is blessed with dedicated staff and generous donors who helped make it possible for us to continue fulfilling our mission during this unprecedented time.

From Starr Academy and Café 15 closing to restricting at-home family visits, Rawhide took 48 hours to examine and update all our practices and equipment necessary to function during quarantine. Our academic instructors began teaching the residential youth in the homes instead of at the school to reduce the possible spread or exposure of the virus. We also began offering telehealth for our therapy sessions.

All of these changes caused many different emotions as we quickly learned what it meant to not be able to do the things we wanted or hoped to do in 2020. But we knew we couldn't falter, because what didn't change in all the chaos was the trauma and 24/7 care our youth needed.

YOUNG LIFE PROGRAM

In June, Rawhide partnered with Young Life, a Christian nonprofit organization that offers spiritual programs and activities for youth, to help us launch a spiritual wellness program on our New London campus!

Through this partnership, we hired Young Life's Program Manager Jared Stanley, who has begun implementing the program. After first embedding himself into the Rawhide community, he started implementing Young Life Community groups, where staff and youth talk about life and learn about Jesus, Christian beliefs and values. Jared often spends one-on-one time with the boys, playing basketball, eating meals, going fishing, taking walks, and meeting with them. Jared has noticed the boys are open to talking and sharing questions about their faith.

He shared this powerful, personal moment with one of our youth:

"One of our 12-year-old residential youth asked me, 'Do you think God still loves people even when He looks down here and sees people treating each other so badly?' The question stopped me in my tracks, and led to a conversation about how awesome God's love is for us."

RAWHIDE YOUTH IN THE COMMUNITY

Last month, a group of Rawhide youth participated in several community service projects. They visited a family in need in Pine River, helping chop and stock firewood to heat their home during the winter. Youth also chopped down trees at Rawhide and loaded a pickup truck to donate to families in need throughout the state.

Rawhide staff who lead these projects teach our residential boys about the importance of giving back, which helps them build character and learn what Christ taught each of us: **Compassion, Honesty, Respect, Integrity, Safety, and Teamwork.**





EQUINE THERAPY



Each year we work with about 500 at-risk youth struggling with behavioral and mental health issues, including suicidal thoughts, depression, anxiety, ADHD and more.

Our CHAPS Equine-Assisted Therapy is an effective option for youth ready to overcome their severe abuse, trauma or neglect from childhood. Equine therapy sessions are conducted under the guidance of a specialized therapist and a trained horse. Once a youth and horse connect, they begin to feel more comfortable opening up, which allows them to start the healing process.

We offer equine-assisted therapy in Fond du Lac, New London and Shiocton.



YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH BY THE NUMBERS

According to Prevent Suicide Wisconsin®:

SUICIDE # CAUSE OF DEATH for 10-19 YEAR OLDS between 2013-2017.

According to the 2017 Youth Risk Behavior Survey, about **1 IN 6 WISCONSIN** public high school **STUDENTS** said they considered **ENDING THEIR LIFE**.

One thing I learned about Rawhide is that we are not just a placement when we're here; they set us up for our future."


